### District 96 Early Childhood Curricula

The Early Childhood team created developmentally appropriate targets aligned with the Illinois Early Learning Standards, while using the philosophies and components of the Bridges math and Launchpad literacy curricula.

### PLAY LASEA INSTRUCTION

- What is it and why is it important?
- "Children are naturally motivated to play. A play-based program builds on this motivation, using play as a context for learning. In this context, children can explore, experiment, discover and solve problems <u>in imaginative and</u> <u>playful ways</u>."
- "A play-based approach involves both child-initiated and teacher-supported learning. The teacher encourages children's learning and inquiry through interactions that aim to stretch their thinking to higher levels."

### PLAY LASEA INSTRUCTION LELPS

#### Grow socially by:

Learning how to join a center, negotiate with peers, share toys and materials, show responsibility for an area and cleaning up, and last for knowing how to ask for help.

#### Become self-aware by understanding:

Time management, self-regulation, and gives them time to explore their own interests.

#### Learn through:

Making mistakes, practicing skills over and over again, extend learning, learn new skills, develop language.

## Report Caras

Early childhood targets will be reported out on three times a year at the end of each trimester.

We look at literacy, math, social emotional and physical health standards.

Report card scores: It is encouraged, not required, that students reach mastery (3.0) before kindergarten. Also remember, it is developmentally appropriate for 3 year olds to be exhibiting a 1.0-2.0 in many of the targets since they still have time in the program to reach their goal of mastery.

Progress goal updates will also go home at these dates if your child has an IEP.


### Literacy curriculum

Launchpad is playful and powerful evidence-based phonics and pre-reading skills instruction that prepares students for kindergarten.

Launchpad is game-based, teacher-led, Interactive, kinesthetic, and multisensory instruction.

- developing letter-sound knowledge
- developing phonological and phonemic awareness.

### Math CURRICULUM



Bridges in Mathematics is a PK–5 curriculum that equips addresses state standards in a rigorous, engaging, and accessible manner. Students gain a deep understanding of concepts, proficiency with key skills, and the ability to solve complex problems.

The curriculum is composed of three distinct but integrated components: Problems & Investigations (whole group instruction) Work Places (small group and independent centers) and Number Corner (calendar based learning)

### Kets to a great tear

### 1. Partnership

Tell me what is going well and what your child needs help with. The more we know the better; celebration of achievement (potty training), noticings at home (increase in a behavior), changes in routines (no more naps)

#### 2. Foster Responsibility

Build independence with opportunities at home and encourage your children to do hard things.

#### 3. Guide-it starts with you!

Providing academics and social opportunities outside of the school environment will only help with a child's development. Limit screen time and increase both fine and gross motor activities.
